CHOREOGRAPHER'S NOTE



In the confines of an office space, two workers are locked in corporate submission. A seemingly ordinary office block is turned inside out by its occupants. Something menacing lies beyond the fluorescent lights. *Killjoy* is a cult

horror film meets live dance-theatre inspired by the Japanese 'salaryman' phenomenon. A satiric look at toxic grind culture and an individual's pursuit to find meaning or resolution in the corporate world.

The work explores parallels between the psychological demands of professional dancers as compared to white-collar workers climbing the corporate ladder. In this world, movement is exhaustive, repetitive, and laborious. A comment on overwork and burnout. Multi-dimensional worlds are embodied by the dancers, torn apart, then reassembled into something sinister. The boundaries between work and play are nebulous.

BIOGRAPHY

Kimberley has presented dance works through STRUT Dance, FRINGE WORLD Perth, STCWA's State of Play program 2021 and independently at The Rechabite Hall. She has performed professionally through FRINGE WORLD Perth, The Blue Room Theatre, Stephanie Lake's *Colossus* and STRUT Dance. Her work *Cry Baby* (2020) was critical in the formation of her self-lead project-based company Parkin Projects, presented in STCWA's State of Play program as part of FRINGE World 2021.

Parkin Projects secured further funding to produce the second instalment of *Cry Baby* in 2021 at The Rechabite Hall, receiving 4 nominations in the 2022 Performing Arts WA Awards. In 2022, Kimberley completed three developments of her dance-theatre work *Killjoy*, thanks to STRUT's SEED grant, Co3's IN.STUDIO program, Propel Youth Arts & Healthway, and STRUTS's inaugural season of GROUNDWORKS 2022.

In collaboration with Olivia Hendry, Kimberley choreographed, performed and co-directed the multidisciplinary short work *MERCURY BONES* featured in STRUT's Situ8:City program at the Liberty Theatre in 2022. Her works delve into the liminal spaces of humanity, highlighting the ridiculous and ambiguous aspects of her surroundings. She is driven by the exploration of multidisciplinary approaches to dance and aims to create accessible performance for a wider demographic.
