

O WITH RAEWYN HILL

What was the inspiration for Archives of Humanity?

The project started with an invitation from Perth Festival Artistic Director lain Grandage to create a work of scale for the 2021 Festival. It fits into my life's body of work. Each work I create is a natural progression from the last in terms of themes, aesthetics and movement language. My artistic offerings over the last few years have focused on the gathering of community, the way that people communicate and the way that they support and care for each other. With Archives of Humanity I've delved deeper into that concept and created an environment of crisis and recovery that strangely ended up in alignment with COVID and the pandemic, even though the work was by no means a response to the situation, it was already in the making.

DANCERS

Bill Viola's *The Raft* was the initial point of investigation as it is a visceral moving portrait of human calamity. The work of Italian painter Michelangelo Merisi da Caravaggio from the late 16th and early 17th century has also been a great source of inspiration for his staged portraits of intense and violent realism. Vivaldi's 'Gloria' has been a source of musical inspiration.

To reflect the work's underlying theme of theme of communities in crisis and how people respond, *Archives of Humanity* is performed by an intergenerational cast with artists ranging in age from 15 to 55 years, their life experiences the underscore of the work.

What is the significance of the title?

The title Archives of Humanity reflects the vast history of human experience and for me, embodies truth. How the audience responds to that truth depends on the experiences they have had in their own lives. The work is an offering for this time and the people who witness it to respond and reflect in their own individual way.

When did you decide it would be more than a dance work and why?


This was not a decision, rather a natural progression that occurred with the bringing together of a multi-generational cast. Each artist brings to the stage their own history and exceptional talent and

that is honoured in the choreography. The slowing down of movement allows the audience to capture minuscule details – the timely blink of an eye expressing and exposing more truth than a grandioso movement phrase.

Tell us about your collaboration with international artist Naoko Yoshimoto. How did this come about and how did the collaboration impact Archives of Humanity?

Naoko's sculptural works have long been an inspiration to me for their aesthetic beauty and poetic storytelling of people, place and community. We began collaborating in 2012, imbedding a solo I had choreographed into her installation a Garden echoing with Heartbeats in Japan. For Archives of Humanity our conversations were initiated by the concept of merging the stories of our WA community into the set, a flock of 1001 birds. In 2019 Naoko resided here in Perth, beginning to construct the birds from donated garments of clothing, each holding legacy from the donor. When the pandemic hit Naoko was unable to return to Australia to complete the birds, and as a result The Bird Makers Project was born. Over 1001 members from our WA community have now made a bird and shared with us their personal story of migration, isolation or significant experience.

community? What has surprised you about this project?

The unexpected reach of the project across the Western Australian community is really almost overwhelming. It became our biggest community engagement program yet, but what I'm particularly so grateful for is the generosity of those involved, especially with the sharing of their stories. These stories have created such a rich platform for the creation of the work, they in themselves reflect the shared human experience. It's been a beautiful chance to engage with the community through this different medium, encouraging everyone to come together, creating through learning the tactility of threading a needle. Those who perhaps would have never engaged with us in a dance context, became richly connected to

the making of this work. It has given all involved a voice, a listening ear. It brought people together through creativity and story, and that shared experience will be palpable between the birds as they fly together.

You have collaborated with composer Eden Mulholland over many years now. With this work, was the music created for the movement or the movement for the music or were they developed together?

Collaborating to create the score for *Archives of Humanity* throughout the pandemic has been a great challenge for Eden and I. Over the years we have established and refined a collaborative process that is completely organic, music is created in response to the dance and the dance is created in response to the music and we work alongside each other, physically sharing the studio space.

When the pandemic hit, we were forced to create remotely and on opposite sides of the country. We collaborated through Zoom and FaceTime, sending archival videos from the studio and receiving audio files in return and vice versa. Despite this challenge, the movement and music are still a result of each other, a testament to our working relationship and the deep respect and understanding we have of each other's artistic practice.

RAEWYN HILL

Co3 Artistic Director/Devisor & Director

Raewyn is one of Australasia's foremost dance practitioners and pioneers whose work as a dancer and choreographer has won critical acclaim in a career spanning 28 years. She was instrumental in the formation of Co3 Contemporary Dance and is its founding Artistic Director.

Prior to Co3, Raewyn was the Artistic Director at Dancenorth in Queensland and had a prolific career as a dancer and an internationally commissioned choreographer and educator. She held prestigious positions at numerous dance companies across the globe, including Cite des Arts (Paris), Baryshnikov Arts

Centre (New York), Juilliard (New York), Bolshoi Ballet Academy (Moscow), Beijing Dance Academy (China), The Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts (China), National Arts Centre (Tokyo), Tokyo Wonder Site (Tokyo) and Saison Foundation (Tokyo).

During her current tenure at Co3, Raewyn has devised and presented innovative mainstage works, built a vibrant youth ensemble and elite training squad, and a range of community engagement programs. In 2018 she was nominated in the Australian Dance Awards for Services to Dance Education, Outstanding Achievement in Choreography (THE **ZONE**) and Outstanding Performance by a Female Dancer for Good Little Soldier (Ochre Contemporary Dance Company). Her dancer training program also became the focus of a postdoctoral research study through Edith Cowan University, Australia. Archives Of Humanity is her latest World Premiere new Australian work, commissioned and presented as part of Perth Festival 2021.



EDEN MULHOLLAND

Composer

Eden (Ngati Uepohatu, Aotearoa) is one of Australasia's most respected and prolific composers and producers for theatre, film, and contemporary dance. His background as a gifted contemporary dancer, together with his ongoing career as a recording artist, means his work not only spans multiple disciplines but also meets the challenges involved in transcending or transgressing conventional genre boundaries.

Eden is well known and sought after for his unusual mix of disciplined focus combined with creative freedom, a balancing act which allows for collaborative improvisation and risk taking when exploring and developing new works. He has received numerous arts festival and commercial sound design awards and is a founding member of the acclaimed multi-disciplined collective Movement of the Human. Eden has made numerous full-length works with Raewyn Hill, with *Archives of Humanity* marking his next composition as a Co3 Associate Artist.

RICHARD LONGBOTTOM Dramaturg

A former dancer with Royal New Zealand Ballet, Richard has a longstanding artistic partnership with Raewyn Hill. Beginning in 2004 he was rehearsal director and general manager for Raewyn's independent dance company, Soapbox Productions. Highlights included presenting at multiple New Zealand festivals and assisting the re-staging of Raewyn's work at the Bolshoi Ballet Academy and Hong Kong Academy of Performing Arts. Richard was a founding member of Co3 Contemporary Dance, joining the company in 2015 as community engagement director (additionally undertaking the role of dance director) and later as executive director. Richard has held numerous roles in the Australian dance sector, including at Dancenorth and Tasdance.



ALICE KELL

Artistic Associate

Alice joined Co3 Contemporary Dance as a guest artist for the return season of *re:Loaded* in 2016. She began working with Raewyn Hill at Dancenorth in 2012 and has a background in the creative industries spanning 15 years, having worked in Australia and Europe as a dance theatre performer and choreographer.

After graduating from QUT Alice joined Dancenorth in 2005 and in 2009 became freelance designing and coordinating costumes for notable companies including Force Majeure, Physical Virus Collective (Germany), Animal Farm Collective, Regurgitator and the Australian Ballet. In 2015 Alice extended her love for design by completing a Diploma of Interior Design with a focus on set design.

MADIXIO YOSHIMOTO Sculptural Artist

Naoko was born in Japan and studied BA Analytical Psychology at the Faculty of Education at Kyoto University and weaving at Kawashima Textile School. She researched the ritualistic use of clothing and contemporary art practice in the UK and received the Kyoto Prefecture Cultural Prize (2011). Naoko has exhibited works in museums and galleries, including solo shows in USA, Japan, UK, Singapore, Italy and Austria and in 2013 first collaborated with Raewyn Hill on the performance work Flock at the National Art Center Tokyo. 2020 marks seven years of creative collaboration between Raewyn and Naoko. She has been a regular contributor to the Bird Makers Community Group on Facebook and has been working with local communities in Japan on bird making workshops as part of a virtual residency supported by the Australia Japan Foundation.



Production Manager & Lighting Designer

Mark's practice is a hybrid of technical production, design, direction and performance. He has worked with many leading Australian and international contemporary arts companies across performance, dance, music and visual arts practice and toured work across four continents. He has built projects with Sydney Theatre Company, Marrugeku, Erth Visual and Physical, Societas Raffaello Sanzio, Stalker Theatre, The Farm, Legs on the Wall, Performance Space, Company B Belvoir, Co3 and was production manager for the original season of Muriel's Wedding the Musical. He has created unique festival performances and lit some of the world's leading DJs and fashion houses. Through his company kdmindustries he explores performance-based collaborations between non-traditional theatrical artists.




Design Associate








LUCI YOUNG
